Section 1. Section 2. 



#### CITY OF SEATTLE

RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION modifying the template for regular payment of claims ordinances. WHEREAS, Seattle City Charter Article IV, Section 24 requires regular formal presentation of payment of City claims to the City Council prior to making payments; and

- WHEREAS, prior to 1999, the City Charter required the Auditing Committee to examine all claims and demands against the City, and recommend to the City Council the allowance or disallowance of the same or any part thereof; and
- WHEREAS, a Charter amendment, submitted pursuant to Ordinance 119576 as passed by the City Council in 1999, and approved by Seattle electors in 1999, removed all references to the Auditing Committee from the City Charter; and

- AN ORDINANCE modifying Ordinance 126081 concerning repayment plans for rental arrears accrued during or within six months after the termination of the civil emergency declared on March 3, 2020. WHEREAS, on February 29, 2020, Washington Governor Jay Inslee declared a state of emergency in response to new cases of COVID-19, directing state agencies to use all resources necessary to prepare for and
  - respond to the outbreak; and
- WHEREAS, on March 3, 2020 the Mayor proclaimed a civil emergency related to the spread of COVID-19, authorizing the Mayor to exercise the emergency powers necessary for the protection of the public peace, safety, and welfare; and
- WHEREAS, on March 5, 2020 the Council adopted Resolution 31937 affirming the civil emergency, modifying orders transmitted by the Mayor related to the emergency, and establishing Council's expectations related to future orders and reporting by the Mayor during the civil emergency; and
- WHEREAS, on July 22, 2020, the Local Health Officer for King County issued a directive and order requiring quarantine or isolation to stem the spread of COVID-19 in the community; and
- WHEREAS, on March 14, 2020 the Mayor issued a civil emergency order related to residential evictions; and
- WHEREAS, on March 16, 2020 the Council adopted Resolution 31938 affirming and modifying the civil emergency order related to residential evictions and establishing Council's expectations related to future orders during the civil emergency; and
- WHEREAS, subsequent emergency orders extended the moratorium on evictions through February 28, 2022;

and

- WHEREAS, the COVID-19 crisis has had a significant impact on the local economy, and the improvements in economic conditions since the start of the pandemic were put at risk by the Omicron variant, with corollary impacts on income for many households; and
- WHEREAS, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines state that those who develop symptoms or who test positive for COVID-19 without symptoms stay isolated for at least five days and those exposed to COVID-19 and not up to date on vaccinations stay home for five days, assuming no symptoms arise; and
- WHEREAS, meeting requirements to self-isolate due to illness, a positive test, or exposure to COVID-19, the need to care for household members with illness or exposure, or the loss of child care arrangements due to outbreaks could have substantial impacts on household income and the ability to stay current on rent, and these risks are compounded for workers without paid sick or safe time, those who work in the "gig economy," and historically disadvantaged populations that are already at greater risk of eviction; and
- WHEREAS, the combined economic repercussions of COVID-19 on household income, including the ability to pay rent, is expected to continue for the duration of the public civil emergency, and for a notable period afterward for many households; and
- WHEREAS, the Census Bureau's Household Pulse Survey released on February 16, 2022 estimates that more than 77,000 households in the Seattle area with incomes below \$50,000 remain behind on rent; and
- WHEREAS, the September 2018 Seattle Women's Commission and the King County Bar Association's report Losing Home: The Human Cost of Eviction in Seattle ("Losing Home Report") found that the most disadvantaged groups face the highest likelihood of eviction; and
- WHEREAS, the Losing Home report found that most evicted respondents became homeless, with 37.5 percent completely unsheltered, 25.0 percent living in a shelter or transitional housing, and 25.0 percent staying with family or friends. Only 12.5 percent of evicted respondents found another apartment or home to

move into; and

- WHEREAS, a 2018 investigation by the King County Medical Examiner's Office found that over half of 107 presumed homeless deaths investigated occurred outside and attributed approximately 121, or 62 percent, of presumed homeless deaths investigated to non-natural causes (drug overdose, accidents (including hypothermia), suicide, homicide, and undetermined), making it clear that people experiencing homelessness have a much higher risk than the general population of developing exposure -related conditions; and
- WHEREAS, persons with underlying health conditions are at greater risk of fatality if they catch COVID-19, and preventing individuals from becoming higher-risk patients will protect the public health, safety, and welfare of the region; and
- WHEREAS, *The Negative Effects of Instability on Child Development*, published in 2013 by the Urban Institute, found that "[c]hildren experiencing residential instability demonstrate worse academic and social outcomes than their residentially-stable peers, such as lower vocabulary skills, problem behaviors, grade retention, increased high school drop-out rates, and lower adult educational attainment"; and
- WHEREAS, as of January 2022, The City of Seattle has allocated over \$55 million to provide rental assistance to individuals and households whose ability to pay rent has and continues to be impacted by the public health emergency and to date over 6,300 individuals and households have received rental assistance payments, with about \$25 million of funds still remaining to be distributed, in addition to funding available through King County's rental assistance program; and
- WHEREAS, it is unlikely that all households that are behind on their rent due to the effects of the pandemic will receive rental assistance, and rental assistance funding may not be sufficient to assist all impacted households; and
- WHEREAS, as of March 29, 2022, the state and City COVID-19 public health emergencies continue; and

- WHEREAS, on May 11, 2020, the Council passed Ordinance 126081, which allows a tenant who fails to pay rent when due during or within six months after the termination of the civil emergency proclaimed by Mayor Durkan on March 3, 2020 to elect to pay such overdue rent in installments; and
- WHEREAS, the repayment schedule envisioned by Ordinance 126081 was based on certain assumptions as to the amount of past due rent that was likely to accumulate, assuming a relatively prompt end to the pandemic; and
- WHEREAS, the civil emergency proclaimed by Mayor Durkan on March 3, 2020 has continued for an additional twenty-two months since the Council passed Ordinance 126081, meaning that repayment plans conforming with the City's ordinance may in many cases not be sufficient to address tenants' needs; and
- WHREAS, the Washington State Legislature established requirements for the repayment of rental arrears accrued during and within six months after the COVID-19 public health emergency declared by Governor Inslee that limits monthly repayment to one-third of the monthly rental charges during the period the debt was accrued, among other requirements (RCW 59.18.630); and
- WHEREAS, the provisions of RCW 59.18.630 regarding repayment plans are an appropriate way of addressing tenants' needs for additional time to make past due rental payments given the duration of the pandemic, but the City Council finds that it is necessary to ensure that, within the City of Seattle, those provisions apply to unpaid rent that accrued between March 3, 2020 and six months after the termination of the civil emergency proclaimed by Mayor Durkan on March 3, 2020; and
- WHEREAS, providing households reasonable opportunity to repay rental arrears is expected to decrease the likelihood that individuals and families will fall into homelessness and enable tenants in the City whose income and ability to work is affected due to COVID-19 to remain in their homes; NOW, THEREFORE,

### BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 2 of Ordinance 126081 is amended as follows:

Section 2.

A. ((A tenant who fails to pay rent when due during, or within six months after the termination of, the civil emergency proclaimed by Mayor Durkan on March 3, 2020, may elect to pay such overdue rent in installments. The tenant shall pay one month or less of overdue rent in three consecutive, equal monthly installments. The tenant shall pay over one month and up to two months of overdue rent in five consecutive, equal monthly payments. The tenant shall pay over two months of overdue rent in six consecutive, equal monthly payments. Any remainder from an uneven division of payments will be part of the last payment. The tenant may propose an alternative payment schedule, which, if the landlord agrees to it, shall be described in writing and signed by the tenant and landlord and deemed an amendment to any existing rental agreement.))

A landlord must offer a repayment plan in conformity with subsections (2), (3), and (5) of RCW 59.18.630, except that, notwithstanding any contrary language in RCW 59.18.630(2), the requirement of this subsection 2.A applies if a tenant has remaining unpaid rent that accrued between March 3, 2020 and six months following the termination of the civil emergency proclaimed by Mayor Durkan on March 3, 2020.

B. No late fee, interest, or other charge due to late payment of rent shall accrue during, or within one year after the termination of, the civil emergency proclaimed by Mayor Durkan on March 3, 2020.

C. If a landlord issues a notice to terminate tenancy for nonpayment of rent that was due during, or within six months after the termination of, the civil emergency proclaimed by Mayor Durkan on March 3, 2020, the notice must contain the following statement: "City law ((entitles you to pay overdue rent in installments)) requires a landlord to offer a reasonable schedule for repayment of unpaid rent that accrued between March 3, 2020, and six months following the termination of the civil emergency proclaimed by Mayor Durkan on March 3, 2020. If your landlord does not ((accept payment according

to the installment schedule)) offer such a repayment plan or give you 14 days to accept a reasonable repayment plan before proceeding with an unlawful detainer action, you may raise this as a defense to eviction in court." It is a defense to eviction if the notice does not contain the required information.

D. An award of attorneys' fees and statutory court costs to a landlord arising from an eviction proceeding raising defenses authorized by this ordinance is prohibited unless otherwise allowed by law.

E. Failure of the ((owner to accept payment under the installment schedule)) landlord to offer a repayment plan as provided in subsection 2.A of this ordinance, or to give a tenant 14 days to accept a reasonable repayment plan before proceeding with an unlawful detainer action, is a defense to eviction.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force 30 days after its approval by the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten days after presentation, it shall take effect as provided by Seattle Municipal Code Section 1.04.020.

### PROPERTY USE AND DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT

THIS INSTRUMENT is executed this date in favor of the City of Seattle, a municipal corporation (herein "City"), and by Willow Crossing LLLP, a Washington limited liability limited partnership (herein "Grantor").

### **WITNESSETH:**

WHEREAS, Grantor is vested in fee simple title in the real property located at 6901 Martin Luther King Jr. Way S, Seattle, King County, Washington, described on Exhibit 1 hereto and 3823 S Willow Street, Seattle, King County, Washington, described on Exhibit 2 hereto (herein collectively called the "Property"); and

WHEREAS, Grantor filed a petition in Clerk File 314422 for the vacation of the portion of 39<sup>th</sup> Avenue South lying south of South Willow Street and between Tract 2 of Coffman Garden Tracts, as recorded in Volume 10 of Plats on page 17, and Block 16, Hillman City Addition, as recorded in Volume 11 of Plats on page 23 all in the Southeast quarter of the Northwest quarter of Section 27, Township 24 North, Range 4 East of the Willamette Meridian, as more particularly described on Exhibit 3 hereto, which petition was considered pursuant to Chapter 35.79 of the Revised Code of Washington and Seattle Municipal Code Chapter 15.62; and

WHEREAS, the Sustainability and Transportation Committee of the Seattle City Council held a public hearing on the vacation petition on November 20, 2019; and

WHEREAS, the Seattle City Council granted approval of the vacation petition subject to conditions on November 25, 2019; and

WHEREAS, Grantor is executing this Property Use and Development Agreement (the "Agreement" or "PUDA") to ensure compliance with any on-going conditions of the vacation approval subsequent to passage of the vacation ordinance; and

**NOW, THEREFORE**, Grantor hereby covenants, bargains, and agrees on behalf of itself and its successors and assigns as follows:

- **Section 1.** The conditions passed by the City Council on November 25, 2019, specified the following conditions of vacation approval:
  - 1. The vacation is granted to allow Grantor to build a project substantially in conformity with the project presented to the City Council and for no other purpose. The project must be substantially in conformity with the proposal reviewed by the Sustainability and Transportation Committee in November of 2019.
  - 2. All street improvements shall be designed to City standards, as modified by these conditions to implement the public benefit requirements, and be reviewed and approved

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by the Seattle Department of Transportation ("SDOT") through a Street Improvement Permit; elements of the street improvement plan and required street improvements to be reviewed include:

- Establishing curb lines, sidewalk dimensions and garage entry;
- Location of utility facilities, including SCL poles and SPU solid waste bins,
- Landscaping, and
- Material use, signage, art elements and other public benefit features in the right-of-way.
- 3. The utility issues shall be resolved to the full satisfaction of the affected utility prior to the approval of the final vacation ordinance. Prior to the commencement of any development activity on the site, Grantor shall work with the affected utilities and provide protection for the utility facilities. This may include easements, restrictive covenants, relocation agreements, or acquisition of the utilities, which shall be at the sole expense of Grantor. Utilities impacted include:

### SPU:

- Fire hydrant: relocate or provide an easement;
- Review landscaping with SPU; and
- Complete permitting work on solid waste and recycling staging and pick up services provided on S Willow Street.

### SCL:

- Complete work on location of new poles on both MLK and S Willow Street.
- 4. It is expected that development activity will commence within approximately 18 months of City Council's approval on November 25, 2019, and that development activity will be completed within 5 years. To ensure timely compliance with the conditions imposed by the City Council, Grantor shall provide SDOT with regular reports providing an update on the development activity, schedule, and progress on meeting the conditions and anticipated date of project completion and opening. Grantor shall not request or be issued a Final Certificate of Occupancy until SDOT determines that all conditions have been satisfied and all fees have been paid as applicable.
- 5. In addition to the conditions imposed through the vacation process, the project as it proceeds through the permitting process is subject to SEPA review and to conditioning pursuant to City codes through the regulatory review processes.
- 6. Free speech activities such as hand billing, signature gathering, and holding signs, all without obstructing access to the space, the building, or other adjacent amenity features, and without unreasonably interfering with the enjoyment of the space by others, shall be allowed within the on-site vacation public benefit features. While engaged in allowed activities, members of the public shall not be asked to leave for any reason other than conduct that unreasonably interferes with the enjoyment of the space by others. Signage clearly identifying public access and allowed free speech activities shall be required at

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the public open space elements and shall require the review and approval of SDOT Street Vacations. Signage shall be consistent with signage provided for public amenity spaces, if any, on the site. Any violation of these conditions will be enforced through Chapter 15 .90 of the Seattle Municipal Code.

- 7. Signage clearly identifying public access shall be required at the public open space elements and shall require the review of SDOT Street Vacations. The final design of the public benefit elements shall require the review and approval of SDOT Street Vacations. SDOT Street Vacations may require additional review by the Design Commission as needed. Changes to the proposed public benefits require SDOT review and may necessitate additional Design Commission review. The value column in the matrix below reflects the estimated value of the public benefit features and obligations, the off-site contribution reflects the actual value of the payment obligation.
- 8. Grantor shall develop and maintain the public benefit elements as approved by the City Council. The public benefit requirements include the following features:

- **Section 2.** An executed copy of this Agreement shall be recorded in the records of King County for the Property and the covenants hereof shall be deemed to attach to and run with each portion of the Property.
- Section 3. Grantor shall have the reasonable right to temporarily close, obstruct, limit access, or establish temporary hours of public access to the public benefits areas for: (1) construction, provided that any removed or permanently closed areas shall be replaced by Grantor to the satisfaction of the City before the area is removed or permanently closed; (2) maintenance and repair; (3) temporary use for private functions by Grantor, tenants, or other occupants of the Property; (4) the maintenance of or security for the development or persons using the development; (5) other circumstances beyond Grantor's control; or (6) as Grantor reasonably deems necessary to comply with any applicable law, regulation, or order. Grantor may adopt reasonable rules and regulations regarding the use of and access to the public benefits. The rules and regulations shall be consistent with this Agreement. A summary of the current rules and regulations, if rules are adopted, shall be posted in several visible locations at the public benefits areas.
- **Section 4.** Grantor reserves the right to use the public benefits areas for any purpose which does not interfere with the public's use rights established hereunder, including but not limited to the right to use the areas as described in this Agreement for Grantor's purposes (including the right to use the areas by Grantor's tenants, subtenants, and other occupants), and the right to grant easements, provided the easements are consistent with the public's use rights established hereunder.
- **Section 5.** Nothing in this Agreement shall constitute a public dedication of any portion of the Property or impose any restriction on any part of the Property other than the areas designated for the public benefits.
- **Section 6.** This Agreement is made for the benefit of the City and the public. Grantor is responsible for the obligations of this Agreement. The City may institute and prosecute any proceeding at law or in equity to enforce this Agreement.
- **Section 7.** It is further expressly agreed that if any covenant or condition or restriction in this instrument or any portion thereof is invalid or void, such invalidity or voidness shall in no way affect any other covenant, condition or restriction.
- Section 8. Upon the effective date of the vacation ordinance, Grantor shall provide and thereafter maintain in full force and effect, commercial general liability insurance providing for a limit of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence for damages arising out of bodily injuries or death. The insurance policies obtained shall be issued by companies authorized to conduct business in Washington State and shall name the City as an additional insured. Grantor shall

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provide evidence of insurance to the City Risk Manager at the City's reasonable request.

Section 9. Grantor covenants and agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City of Seattle, its officials, officers, employees, and agents from all liabilities, claims, causes of action, judgments, or expenses, including reasonable attorney fees and necessary litigation expenses, resulting from any actual or alleged bodily injury including death or actual or alleged damage to property arising out of or in connection with the use or occupation of the public benefits described herein during the term of its ownership of the Property. Upon any transfer of ownership of the Property, this obligation shall be binding on all successors and assigns. The indemnification obligations under this Agreement do not apply to any liabilities, claims, causes of action, judgments or expenses resulting from bodily injury or property damage caused by the negligence or intentional acts of the public or the City, or the City's officers, employees, elected officials, agents, or subcontractors.

**Section 10.** This Agreement shall be binding on Grantor's successors and assigns. Grantor and each future owner of the Property shall be bound to this Agreement only during the period of its ownership.

**Section 11.** This Agreement may be amended or modified by agreement between Grantor and the City; provided any such amendment, per Council rules, shall be subject to approval by the City Council by ordinance. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as a surrender of the City's governmental powers.

This Council Bill completes the vacation process for a portion of 39<sup>th</sup> Avenue South, lying south of South Willow Street and between Tract 2 of Coffman Garden Tracts, in the Othello neighborhood, on the petition of Willow Crossing LLLP.

The Petitioner sought the vacation for the development of an affordable housing project on a consolidated block. Following a November 20, 2019 public hearing on the petition, the City Council conditionally granted the petition.



- WHEREAS, since 1965 Medicare has been the national health care system for seniors and the disabled in the United States; and
- WHEREAS, Medicare beneficiaries are among the most vulnerable populations served in health care, and need more, not fewer, benefits and protections; and
- WHEREAS, traditional Medicare holds sacred the relationship between Medicare beneficiaries and their chosen health care provider; and
- WHEREAS, traditional Medicare, is a public good and should not be privatized; and
- WHEREAS, Wall Street has for decades tried and failed to privatize the Social Security system; and
- WHEREAS, the prospect of Wall Street getting a piece of what is projected to be \$1.6 trillion of annual Medicare spending by 2028 has led to a rush to buy-up Accountable Care Organizations for managing Medicare services; and
- WHEREAS, the Trump administration opened the door to the complete privatization of Medicare through a Direct Contracting pilot program allowing private equity firms, insurance companies, and corporate health businesses to directly contract to provide Medicare services; and
- WHEREAS, the Biden administration ended the Direct Contracting pilot and rebranded it as the ACO REACH (Accountable Care Organization Realizing Equity, Access, and Community Health) pilot to begin in January of 2023; and

WHEREAS, public health advocates across the country see little difference between ACO REACH and the Direct Contracting pilot, since both pilot programs allow third party private entities to wedge themselves between patients and their healthcare providers and to draw down the Medicare Trust Fund by making huge profits in several ways, including weakening services for Medicare beneficiaries; and WHEREAS, nothing in the ACO REACH pilot spells out a systemic way to address the real inequities suffered by BIPOC individuals and BIPOC communities due to historic under-resourcing; and WHEREAS, addressing real equity issues can be done within the traditional Medicare system; NOW, THEREFORE,

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEATTLE THAT:

Section 1. The City Council opposes the privatization of the Medicare system, favors terminating the Accountable Care Organization Realizing Equity, Access, and Community Health (ACO REACH) pilot program, and favors closing the door on third party entities in the Medicare system.
